
# Parkwood Presbyterian Church Annual Reports The 1960s

Up to the spring of 2023 Parkwood Church Annual Reports were available in pdf format from 2001 the most current (2022), and in paper format only from 2000 back to 1965. That spring a project to create pdf versions of the reports for the period 2000 back was undertaken as a grade 12 volunteer project by Cheyenne Copeland under the supervision of her grandfather, Gord Walford. Some of the reports had personal notes written by the owner (mainly Gord Walford and Evelyn Warburton); some of these have been removed, some retained. All years's reports have been "bookmarked". Some reports from 2001 on list errors (errata); in some years those errors have been corrected. In earlier years it was the practice of the clerk of session to issue a copy of the minutes of a given Annual Congregational Meeting shortly after the meeting took place; where this occurred those minutes are appended to the Annual Report for that year, and bookmarked accordingly. For ease of access, Annual Reports have been grouped by decade.

To: THE CHRISTIANS IN PARKWOOD HILLS SCHOOL,

The tone of the Ottawa Citizen's article on the Church and me was a reminder of the pioneering that has been done these past months. Without any previous experience, Wallace Storie and Wilf. McKenny built up a Church School. And many of the teachers were learning more than the pupils, too! John Johns and Ron Baird formed the nucleus of a Senior High Fellowship late on in the year which should be ready to function in the fall. Probably the most modest group was the one that called itself the Society for Ignorant Christians, as it strove to overcome that title through the study of current religious books. The forty people with portable chairs gathered in Ken Brown's living room for the first Membership Seminar was reminiscent of the early Christian Church in the homes of Rome. Now, as a result of the annual meeting we have a Session and Board of Monagers, which should make this whole venture for God better prepared for the fall. I will be teaching at the Ottawa Technical High School beginning September which will enable us to become self-supporting sooner, and able to buy needed land more readily, but it will also mean that our health as a congregation will continue to depend upon all of us together.

It has been decided that during July and August, services will NOT be held in the School, but that worshippers will join with the congregation of St. Paul's, at Woodroffe and the Queensway. While we may struggle along with interim supply ministers during my holidays, and with a handful of people who are in the city, we believe the summer break will bring us all back more prepared in the Fall.

Activities will not entirely end this month. Seven dedicated people, four of them from this congregation, will be conducting a Daily Vacation Bible School in the Parkwood Hills School during the mornings of the first two weeks in July. This is only part of a large program of such schools in the city supported partly by the Red Feather, and partly by donations and fees. It is a highly organized and well managed Christian Education program. If the Monday evening training classes for teachers are an indication of the thoroughness of the school, your children will get a lot out of it.

The Rev. Ross MacKay, Director of Church Extension for Ottawa and Montreal, will share the pulpit with me on June 27th, our last service for the summer. I expect by that time to have all boxes and debris shoved out of sight in our new home at 1242 Meadowlands so that we will be able to have everyone over for tea after the service. I do not think we customerily dedicate Menses, although many things outside the sanctuary have been dedicated. My brother who ministers in Arthur, Ontario, was called upon to dedicate that town's new sewage system.

There are attached some items of missionary interest and the minutes of the annual meeting. Best wishes for the summer season.

On Monday, June 7, 1965, the first Congregational Meeting of Parkwood Presbyterian Church was held in Parkwood Hills Public School. The meeting was conducted by the Minister. Rev. R.H. Balsdon, and was opened with the Scripture Lesson Acts 6: 1-7 followed by Hymn Number 296.

The Congregation was then invited to vote for six Elders from the list of nineteen eligible men. Messrs. Kenneth Brown and Tom Warburton declined to stand for election as an Elder. The following members were elected as Elders:

Messrs. George Brown; Ray Burrell; Joseph Francis; David Poland: R.W. Storie and John Torrance

and same were approved by a quorum of the Interim Session and are to be ordained on the 20th June, 1965, at 11:00 o'clock.

The next item on the Agenda was the election of six members for the Board of Managers - one-third of these will retire each year. The retiring members may be re-elected. It was suggested at the meeting of the Steering Committee that names would be submitted from the floor with a secret ballot to follow. The two carrying the highest votes would be elected for three years, the next two for twoyears and the last two for one year in order that this system may be carried out.

The following were nominated:

Messrs. C. Clark, W. Tenhaaf, J. Tan, T. Warburton, W. McKenny, Robert Young, A. MacMillan, A. Lawson, Mrs. R.W. Storie and Mr. Alistaire Young.

Mr. C. Clark moved the nominations cease and the motion was seconded by Mr. R.W. Storie. The following members were elected to the Board of Man gers:

For three years - Messrs. C. Clark and W. Tenhaaf: For two years - Mr. W. McKenny and Mrs. R.W. Storie For one year - Messrs. A. Lawson and T. Warburton.

During the intermission, the pianist, Miss Patsy Bawden, led in the singing of Hymn 253 as she was most anxious for us to recognize and learn this hymn.

Mr. Joseph Francis, Chairman of the Steering Committee and a member of the Interim Board of Managers which looked after the affairs of the Church until such time as it was organized as a Congregation, wished the new Session and Board of Managers God's blessing and asked that His Hand would guide them in the months and years ahead. He gave a synopsis of the discussions which have been carried out with Rev. J. Cooper and Rev. Ross MacKay regarding the search for suitable sites for the proposed church and recommended that the new Board of Managers appoint a committee at the earliest possible date to go into the study of these and other pertinent matters. He also mentioned that Messrs.

George Brown. W. Tenhaaf and Lawrence Patterson have formed

a Committee, composed of a General Chairman and two members, to participate in the Gospel Programme which will be carried out in the Fall and which has been sponsored by the Ottawa Area Stewardship Committee.

A further motion was made by Mr. Francis that we grant an honorarium to our Pianist in the amount of Twenty-five dollars per month as of the 1st September, 1965, and this was seconded by Mr. W. Tenhaaf. CARRIED

Mr. Francis concluded his remarks by mentioning it had been a great honour and privilege to serve the congregation and church in the early stages of development and made particular mention of the members of the Steering Committee, namely, Messrs. R.H. Balsdon, Murray Fraser, Kenneth Brown (Treasurer), R. Wallace Storie (Director of Christian Education), C. Clarke (Public Relations Officer) and John Torrance (Convenor of Ushers).

Mr. Kenneth Brown, the Treasurer, was then called upon to give the Provisional Treasurer's report. A copy of this report had been previously submitted to each member and Mr. Brown carefully reviewed each item. He moved that Mr. Francis accept the financial statement and the motion was seconded by Mr. Alistaire Young. CARRIED

Mr. Francis then moved that his report and the Treasurer's report be adopted in total. This was seconded by Mr. Alistaire Young. CARRIED

The following persons were nominated as Auditors:

Messrs. Robert Young, John Torrance and Murray Fraser.

As a result of a vote by show of hands, Messrs. Robert Young and John Torrance were elected.

It was moved by Mr. Kenneth Brown that a Secretary be engaged for the Secretarial duties of the church at a remuneration of Fifteen Dollars per month as of the 1st September, 1965 and Mrs. R.W. Storie was nominated. This was seconded by Mrs. Poland. Mrs. Balsdon moved the nominations be closed and this was seconded by Mr. D. Poland. CARRIED

Mr. Balsdon requested a volunteer to look after the roster of the Nursery Department, duties to commence September 1st.

Summer service arrangements had to be made before the Congregational meeting and after much discussion at a meeting of the Steering Committee, it was decided it would be advisable to dispense with the services during the months of July and August of this year. This would mean the last service would be June 27th, 1965, and services would be commenced September 5, 1965.

It was moved by Mr. C. Clarke of the Steering Committee that a vote of thanks be extended the following persons for services rendered during the past year:

Miss Patsy Bawden, Mrs. Helene Storie, Messrs. Peter Lambros and Murray Fraser,

and to all those people who did so much work for us and who are not specifically mentioned. Seconded by Mr. R.W. Storie. CARRIED

At 10:30 p.m. it was moved by R.W. Storie that the meeting be adjourned. A delightful lunch was served the Congregation by the following ladies: Mrs. Joseph Francis, Mrs. Wilfred McKenny, Mrs. John Torrance and Mrs. David Wright.



## REPORT OF THE KIRK SESSION PARK OD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Since election at the Congregational Meeting on 7th June, 1965, there have been five regular meetings of the kirk Session and one pro re nata meeting at which the members of the Board of Lanagers were also present.

The Sacrament of Holy Communion was celebrated on two occasions, the 10th October and 12th December, 1965.

No new members have been received into communion of the Congregation in this period.

The communion roll now stands at 53, one member having left by certificate of transfer.

The number of members and adherents at present represents approximately 50 families.

Mr. J.W. Francis and Mr. D.G. Poland were appointed representaelders to the Presbytery of Ottawa and the Board of managers of Congregation, respectively.

At the joint meeting/with the Board of Managers it was agreed that an every member canvas be carried out by the elders. A total of 46 families were visited and as a result of the opinions received the kirk Session now recommend to the Congregation that a Building Fund be established for the purchase of a site for a future Church building.

The offering received at the Christmas Eve Service has been deposited in an account with the Bank of Nova Scotia as the nucleus of a Session Welfare Fund.

#### ANNUAL REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

As will be recalled our Church School commenced operation during October 1964. At that time we had 5 teachers and 35 pupils and operated a Kindergarten, Primary, Junior and Junior High Department.

The formation of the Church School was under the direction of our linister. Shortly afterwards in R.W. Storie was appointed Director of Christian Education and Superintendent of the Church School for the congregation. From its inception we have used the material recommended by our Church's General Assembly, the Christian Faith and Life Curriculum.

In order to give our children the best possible education, it was decided to provide two teachers for each Department. In this way both teachers would normally be present in a classroom and could give more pupils individual attention and at the same time would afford each teacher an opportunity to be absent from class on a certain Sunday without disrupting the routine of the class.

It has not been easy to staff our school with good dedicated teachers; however, it is my personal opinion that on the whole this has worked out very well.

Our present staff is as follows:-

During June of 1965 your Session appointed Ar. Wilfred McKenny Church School Superintendent.

#### TEACHER'S TRAINING -

A Conference is held at the beginning of each Quarterly Session of Church School material. Our Minister attends these meetings and gives us the benefit of his many years of experience in this type of work.

A Nursery Department has been operated since October 1964 and for the direction we owe our gratitude to the following: Lars. Rosa Brown and Lars. Helene Storie.

A Senior High group was organized in May 1965 and is under the able direction of messrs. Ron Baird and John John. Seven of our Young People are attending this group. Normally, they meet each week in the homes of those attending. On the last week-end in october they combined with their counterparts from St. Andrew's to attend a Retreat at our Presbytery's Camp at Gracefield. Our congregation was represented by 11 leaders-and young people. The Retreat was a success in that it was found to be a great source of inspiration to all attending.

Our Presbytery's Christian Education Committee is aware of the importance of teacher training and with this in mind held a Session on September 29th and 30th, 1965, at St. Giles and Jestminister Churches, Ottawa. Six of our teachers and leaders attended this Conference and found it beneficial.

At the meeting held on 23.6.65 your Session considered a letter from the Ottawa Daily Vocation Bible School in which our participation was requested. This was approved. A number of teachers to whom we are grateful, were recruited from among members of our Congregation who agreed to teach. Several of our children attended these classes at Parkwood School.

At the same meeting your Session approved a course on Sex Education for adults to be conducted in the fall of 1965 with the aid of competent instructors, doctors etc. This Course was to be held in the fall but as you know is currently being held with Dr. Gordon Mouldey, Psychiatrist, as instructor. This is considered a pilot course leading up to a course for our teenagers to be held at a later date.

We joined with St. Martin's Church on June 19, 1965, and held our Congregational Picnic at Vincent Massey Park. It was well attended by all ages in the Congregation and was considered to be a great success. We are indeed grateful to St. Martin's Church for their invitation that we join them and for the splendid manner in which the picnic was organized.

On Londay, December 13, 1965, a Workshop in Adult Education, sponsored by the Ottawa Presbytery's Board of Christian Education was held at Westminister Church. Guest speaker was the Rev. R. Carter who is Assistant Secretary of the Christian Education Committee, Toronto. Our church is concerned about the comparative lack of this phase of Education in our local Congregations. Our Congregation was represented by myself.

#### CHRISTMAS PAGEANT -

On December 24, 1965, a pageant depicting the "Old, Old Story" and featuring our Church School children was put on in Parkwood School gymnasium. The children portrayed their parts very well and were beautifully outfitted in costumes conceived by their parents.

#### IGNORALT CHRISTIANS -

Each week a number of interested persons gather together in the various homes and under the leadership of Lr. R.H. Balsdon discuss and study various books as related to Christian witness. All members of the congregation are cordially invited to come and take part in these discussions.

#### WOLEN'S ASSOCIATION -

On direction of Session, which resulted from enquiries of variou members of the Congregation, a meeting of all ladies of the congregation was convened on 28.11.65 immediately after the morning service of worship to appoint a committee which would determine whether or not sufficient ladies were interested and willing to take part in a Ladies Organization.

This was done and an Association is now in the process of being formed.

To all those persons who have worked on committees, opened their homes for meetings and helped in many other ways to aid with the Christian Education Program of our Church, I offer my sincere thanks on behalf of your Session.

#### Report for Year 1965

As chairman of the Board of Managers it is my privilege to report on behalf of the Board of Managers for the 1965 calendar year.

During the year the following members were transferred. R Lawson, Bill Tenhaaf. With the loss of two members, Mrs Brown offered her services for the remainder of the year, and was accepted.

Your Board met monthly during the year except for the months June July and December.

The theme of most meetings was the problem of purchasing church property. From this a property committee was formed by the following Chuck Clarke, Joe Francis, Bill Stewart.

During the year three advertising drives were carried out (by door to door distribution of pamplets.) Covering Parkwood Hills, Carleton Heights, City View and Meadowlands areas.

A total of approx. 9000 pamplets were distributed, the board is indebted to those parents and teen agers who ably assisted in this advertising and distribution of pamplets.

The Board has recommended and approved to inaugurate

(A) A building Fund

(B) That the building fund will be kept as a separate account.

(C) That the building fund receipts be deposited into the general fund. With a monthly accounting of all building fund receipts.

The congregation will be asked to vote on the above recommendations.

At present there are three serving members on the board who have one or more years to serve, namely Chuck Clarke, Wilf McKenny and Mrs Helene Storie. So there are three vacancies on the board which you will be asked to fill by election. One for a three year term, two for a one year term.

It is suggested that a stand by member also be elected in the event that a serving member is transfer or otherwise lost to the board during his term of office.

There is attached to this report a budget for 1966 and you will be asked to approve it. This budget represents a minimum which your board feels must be met to continue our operation, and to meet our obligations during the comming year.

The board respectfully requests the approval of the financial statement for 1965, the budget for 1966, and the election of three members to fill vacancies on the board, also as mentioned the starting of a building Fund, and in what manner it will accounted for.



#### To the Church in Parkwood Hills

After having watched Bob Hope's Christmas Show in Vietnam, I am reminded of a thought of Dr. H.F. Davidson's that Vietnam is not the only place where the combatants are unsure of who and where the enemy is. The saints have always been in this uncertainty. We have been warned that "a man's foes shall be they of his own household"; but it is disconcerting when we make personal verification of this uncomfortable fact. It makes us ultra cautious and slows down the war effort.

The word "saint" has undergone a change in meaning which has had an eroding influence in morale. Whereas it once denoted, as it commonly does in the New Testament, an objective "belonging to God's people" on the basis of the covenant made with Abraham and fulfilled in Christ, that is a conferred status, it has been switched to denote a subjective goodness based on merit, that is it is a status to be achieved by the individual. When a com-batant becomes pre-occupied with his own safety (holiness), he Becomes a menace to his comrades' safety. His energies will be mis-directed (poor stewardship) toward keeping his hands clean, rather than toward scouring the defilement which comes from his heart to dirty his neighbour. He engages in sham battles. Not only does he develop austerious saintliness ("whited sepulchers" was one term Jesus used to describe such people) which confuses his neighbours but it often happens that the phobias become God's resistor, becomes the worshipper as in Somerset Maughan's parable "Rain". This has the disastrous effect of confirming the careless and foolish in their errors. It gives aid to the enemy. Perhaps it is the enemy who propagates the idea of sainthood as something to be achieved. The devil knows his theology.

Those who are called to be saints must not waste time verifying their status which is an insult to the donor, but must get on with the objective (mission) of awakening their neighbours to the rulership of Christ. "Lost" men and women need to learn their identity. The enemy is keeping them in the dark. We must fight against him by letting them know who their Father is, who their Brother is, and what Family they belong to. For them as for us it's like being born again.

#### SESSION REVIEW - 1966

To the Members and Adherents of Parkwood Presbyterian Church:

Another year has quickly passed and your Session is pleased to present its Annual Review of the activities of the Church for 1966. The reports from the various bodies of the Church will give details of their activities.

The membership of Session is now eight. During October past Messrs. W.R.S. Harris and T. Warburton were ordained to Eldership. Each elder has been assigned a number of members of the congregation, both Communicants and Adherents.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed four times during the year: April 3, June 19, October 2 and December 4. These services have been well attended. Twenty-five names have been added to the Communion Roll; one by Baptism, three by profession of faith and the remainder by certificate. Thirteen persons who are members have moved to other districts; however have not as yet requested Certificates of Transfer. Our total active membership as at December 31 consists of eighty families.

The Christian Education Committee has had a busy year. Our Sunday School has an enrollment of eighty-six pupils ranging from Kindergarten through Senior High. They have a staff of some sixteen teachers who are doing a very worthy job in giving of their time and talent. Much credit is also due our Sunday School Superintendent, Mr. W.J. McKenny. The Delmar Visual Aids program was introduced into the Sunday School this past fall.

Mrs. Jack Hopkins assumed the duties of Director of Music in September 1966 and has done an Herculean task especially with the organization and direction of the Junior Choir.

A series of five lectures on Sex Education was conducted by Dr. Gordon Mauldey commencing on January 23, 1966, to interested adults in the congregation. This series was well attended.

A Women's Association, to be known as the Parkwood Ladies! Circle was formed during February 1966.

The Society for Ignorant Christians has continued to meet one evening a week, this past fall and winter on Sunday evenings.

Our Annual Congregational Picnic, along with St. Martin's Congregation, was held on June 25, 1966 at Vincent Massey Park.

A Committee on Congregational Evangelism under the Chairmanship of Mr. J.W. Francis has been active.

The Committee on Partnership in the Gospel Program under the chairmanship of Mr. J.W. Francis worked diligently during the past fall. The Congregational Dinner was held on November 17th and its work was successfully terminated on Visitation Sunday November 26, 1966.

Our Anniversary Service was held on September 18, 1966. The service was conducted by Mr. G.W. Ramsey.

Laymen's Sunday was observed on 16.10.66. A Christmas Pageant was presented on Christmas Eve by the Sunday School children assisted by the Junior and Senior Choirs.

Ladies and Gentlemen, we are indeed indebted to our Board of managers upon whose shoulders rests great responsibility which involves their time and talent.

I know there are many who have worked hard in our Church during 1966 and whose names I haven't mentioned. To you, on behalf of the bession, I say thank you!

#### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

#### THE CHURCH SCHOOL

The Church School has continued its progress in 1966 under the excellent leadership of Mr. Wilfred McKenny. With a present enrollment of eighty-six, there is an average attendance of fifty-five to sixty. Nine of our teachers are new to the staff of Parkwood Church School this year and it is not possible to stress too strongly the effort and results being shown this year by these men and women. Their influence is a help to the boys and girls today and shall continue to be a help as long as memory lasts. Their reward? That inner feeling that needs no voice to say "Well done!".

Teacher training classes were held in October at Westminster Presbyterian Church on the use of Christian Faith and Life material. Our church staff was well represented.

One of the highlights this year was the introduction of Audio Visual aids to all departments. These have been used in teaching all age groups. Opportunities are given the teachers to preview the audio visual aid to be used so that the method conforms to the lesson, not the lesson to the method. Feature films, Film strips and Hymn slides have all been employed in this field.

Another milestone was the Pageant "Unto Us a Savior" presented in conjunction with the Junior and Senior Choirs on Christmas Eve. This was teamwork at its best as the resultant presentation could not have been achieved without the participation and co-operation of all groups. We tried to show that Christmas still had meaning for people in 1966.

This report would not be complete without mentioning that we propose to inaugurate a class for three year olds. For this we will need two additional teachers. Teachers are also needed in Primary and Junior Classes and as we grow other teachers will be required. God can bestow no greater compliment upon you to place His book in your hands and to call you teacher. #### SESSION REVIEW - 1 9 6 7

To the Members and Adherents of Parkwood Presbyterian Church:

Your Session is pleased to present its Annual Review of the activities of the Church for 1967. The reports from the various bodies of the Church will give details of their activities.

Our Congregation, in the Service of our Master, has taken several important steps this year which are common to a growing Church. Firstly, Rev. R.H. Balsdon found that our congregation had grown to the point where he could no longer carry on as a part-time minister and in November 1965 indicated his intention to resign once a full-time minister was appointed. The Board of Missions selected for us, the Rev. L.R. Files who with his family was then serving in P.E.I. He took over our pulpit on 1st March, 1967.

Secondly, as proof of growth and faith, during the summer we purchased the Mulvagh property at the corner of Chesterton Drive and Meadowlands.

The membership of the Session is now five. During the year Mr. S. Harris was transferred to Winchester and Messrs. J.S. Torrance and G. Brown asked to be retired from the active roll of Session. A number of additional elders are in the process of being elected.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed four times during the year: 19th March, 11th June, 17th September and 12th December. These services were well attended.

During the year 21 persons were added to the Communion Roll: 15 by Certificate and the remainder by Profession of Faith. At the present our Communion Roll has 91 members, of whom 14 have moved from the district but have not as yet requested transfer certificates. Our total active membership as of 31st December consists of 76 families. There were two baptisms during the year.

Your Christian Education Committee has been active and you will find that this aspect of our life has been fully covered in that specific report.

It has been our pleasure and privilege for some time now to work together as a congregation. Let us continue to go forward in faith together.

# GESSION REVIEW - 1 9 6 8

To the Members and Adherents of Parkwood Presbyterian Church:-

Your Session is pleased to report that the Communicant membership of this Congregation now stands at 109; an increase of 17 over last year. This Church represented 76 (and families last year whereas at December 31, 1968, we represented families. Our congregation grew significantly last year!

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was served on 5 occasions during the year - on March 9th, June 19th, July 7th, October 6th and December 8th. Seventy-five communicants and adherents were served on the last occasion.

The Eldership of the Congregation now stands at 9. During January, 1968, Messrs. C.W. Clarke, H. Pett, J. Widdis, R. McIntosh and D. MacGregor were elected to Eldership. It was with regret during November that we lost the valuable services of Mr. D. MacGregor who had accepted a position in Whitby, Ontario.

During January of 1968 a weekly Bible Study program under the leadership of Rev. L.R. Files was commenced. An activity of this nature is most important in the life of the Church and is highly commended to any who can fit it into their busy schedule.

Your Christian Education Committee under the leader ship of Mr. R. McIntosh has been extremely active. You will find more details in this regard in the Church School Report.

In February of 1968 Mr. David Poland was appointed Chairman of the Stewardship and Budget Committee and Messrs. Hugh Pett and Ray Burrell were appointed Co-Chairmen of our Evangelism and Social Action Committee.

At the same time a Visitation Committee consisting of Rev. L.R. Files and Messrs. J. Francis, C. Clarke and D. MacGregor was appointed.

Once again we must say a special "thank you" to Mr. J. Francis especially and to all other members of his "Partnership in the Gospel Program" Committee who worked diligently to bring this year's program to a successful conclusion. At this time also I would be re-miss were I to neglect to say "thank you" to the congregation for their very necessary support of this campaign.

During April of 1968 overtures were made by a member of Bethany Baptist Church to a member of this Congregation suggesting that possibly our two churches could hold common worship services during the summer months. Negotiations were commenced immediately which made this suggestion a reality. The services were to our mutual benefit and many members of our two congregations became acquainted and friendships developed. Is not this true Christianity?

Our Congregation has become active participants of the Nepean Association for the Family. Messrs. John Robertson was and Him Bett were appointed as Parkwoodia normalistic for the family of the second secon and Hest were appointed as Parkwood's representatives for will one year, effective from October 30. 1968

The Presbyterian Church in Canada has been most active in supporting the Nigerian-Bisfran Relief Fund. This congregation supported their plea for funds in that the collection received from the children on White Gift Sunday and the monies collected and normally given over to the Elders' Relief Fund on Christmas Eve were donated specifically to help those left homeless and starving as a result of the African Civil War!

Since September of 1968 negotiations have been proceeding between members of our Church and members of Bethany Baptist Church to determine the feasibility of building a joint sanctuary. Mr. David Poland will report further on this aspect!

On behalf of Session may I take this opportunity to thank our Teaching Elder, Rev. L.R. Files, for his valuable leadership and to thank all members of the congregation who contributed of their time and talent towards the success of this congregation in His Service.

In closing may I remind you that ours is a growing member of His Church! There is much work to be done if we are to serve Him faithfully. We are situated in a growing Community. Like others, it is a Community affected by today's affluence and apathy. We need YOUR support in presenting Christ to the masses. We cannot do less! We must not be found wanting in sparing time and effort to bring others to our Lord and Master, Jesus Christ.

## PARKWOOD PRESBYTERIAN YOUNG PEOPLES -ANNUAL REPORT

The youngs People's group has been involved in many activities since September. This has been possible because of increased membership in the group. The meetings take place at a different home every Sunday night at 7:00 p. m. During the meeting there is usually a Bible reading and then a discussion. The topics of these discussions have been everything from drugs, to "Are Christians the only ones to reach heaven?" We have also had two movies on juvenile delinquents which raised very good discussion.

Our main project has been the adoption of seven year old Desmond Glass, through Dr. Craham's Homes. Desmond lives in Kalimpong, India, where he and his family were literally starving before help came. Since the upkeep of Desmond requires \$10.00 a month, our group is also involved in money-making projects. At a candy sale, a grand total of \$18.33 was brought in. Our calender sale is not yet completed. There are more projects on the way soon.

We can also have quite a lot of fun. Just one example of this was our Christmas Sleighride and party.....

THE CHURCH SCHOOL ANNUAL REPORT

Parkwood Church School continued to make good progress in 1969 under the capable direction of a dedicated and enthusiastic teaching staff, who devote part of their week to further the Christian education of our children. Several of the young people of our congregation have used their talents well in teaching and assisting with Sunday School classes and playing the piano for closing exercises.

We are pleased that the enrollment this year has increased to 110 with an average attendance of 90 pupils. The age groups 4 through 11 are using the Gospel Light curriculum while the older children are following Covenant Life material. Efforts are also being made this year to introduce children to the Presbyterian Memory Course.

An old-time Church School picnic was held in June and approximately 100 people turned out to enjoy the games, fellowship and fine food. In October the young people distributed over 700 circulars in the immediate vicinity of Parkwood Hills School advertising the Sunday program. The Christmas program this year was convened on Sunday afternoon December 15, 1968. All departments of the Church School were represented in the Christmas pageant which was followed by a fellowship hour.

In October a one day workshop of Church School teachers was held at St. Pauls Presbyterian Church. Four Presbyterian Churches participated in this endevour providing practical training for our teachers.

As secretary of the Board of Managers, I offer this report for your consideration the Board for 1968.

After the Congregational Meeting of last year, a meeting of the Board on February 29, 1968 set its membership for the year as follows:

In March new members were filled in on the history of Board matters as discussions began in ernest. It was reported that a water filter at the Manse was not functioning as expected. Reverend J. Cooper, Board of Missions Toronto was notified of the history of the water problem and the expense of connection to city water system. Finances for erection of the Church Sign on the church property were approved and the Board agreed to undertake the job.

A proposal from Bethany Baptist Church on Baseline Road to share their church from the last Sunday in June until Labour Day was received in April. Reverend L. Riles and the registered leader of the congregation attended the Presbyterian Mens' Conference in Ottawa with registration fees paid by the Board.

Negotiations for summer services at the Bethany Baptist Church were completed and arrangements for ushers, collection counting etc. were made at the June meeting. All necessary business to cover the months of July and August were discussed and agreed upon.

The September meeting gave approval to arrangements made by Mr. T. Milne to have water and sewer installed in the Manse since the malfunctioning water filter cound not be repaited. Materials from the destroyed garage were sold and broken limbs of trees on the Manse were removed. Monies were sent to:

- (a) The Christian Reform Church to help defray costs of Daily Bible School held during July at the Parkwood Hills School.
- (b) The Bethany Baptist Church with whom the congregation shared services, collection and facilities during the summer.

Consideration to having a member of the Youth Group join the Board was discussed.

During the month of October a meeting of the Board authorized two large payments:

- (a) the balance of the loan with the Bank of Nova Scotia that had been taken for a down payment on purchase of the church property.
- (b) the first quarterly payment to the Presbyterian Church Lending Fund toward the remaining cost of the church property.

At the December meeting, deferred until the first week in January, the Board received a donation for the Building Fund of \$400.00 from the Ladies Group. A motion of the meeting directed that all monies in the Building Fund at the end of January be sent to the Presbyterian Church Lending Fund.

Two joint meetings were held with the Session. During these meetings discussions concerning the Bethany Baptist Church proposal took place. Reports to follow will explain the proposal.

# PARKWOOD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH ANNUAL MEETING January 25, 1 9 7 0

Approximately twenty-nine members gathered together for the Annual Meeting held on January 25th at 7:00 p.m. in Parkwood Hills Public School.

The Minister, Rev. L.R. Files, took the chair and the meeting was opened with the singing of Hymn 553. The Scripture Lesson was taken from the 1st Chapter of Revelations, beginning at the 1st verse and was followed by a prayer.

It was moved by Mr. W. McKenny and seconded by Mr. P. Lambros that Mrs. H. Storie act as Secretary for the meeting. CARRIED.

After the reading of the minutes of the last Annual Meeting, Mrs. Storie moved their adoption; seconded by Mr. J. Widdis.

With general approval, the reference to the Friday night teenage group referred to in the Report was amended to read "Junior High- 12 and 13 year olds".

Mr. Files explained the purpose and format of the Junior High meetings and informed the meeting that Century School has been acquired for this group. The meetings will be under the joint leadership of .rs. Widdis and Mr. Morris, the first meeting to be held on February 6th

with regard to the Adult Coffee Hour, Mrs. W. Milne, President of the Ladies' Circle, stated this had been brought up at the December meeting and an Executive Meeting was to be held early in February.

Mr. W. Gray moved the adoption of his Church School Report as printed. Ar. Carl McPherson seconded this motion. CARRIED.

Mr. Files thanked Mr. Gray for his tremendous work in bringing in film strips etc.; the Sunday School Teachers for their time and effort and Mr. P. Lambros for the printing of bulletins etc.

In the absence of Mrs. Evelyn Warburton, Mrs. Wanda Milne moved the adoption of the Ladies' Circle Report as printed; seconded by Mrs. Ellen Robertson. CARRIED.

It was mentioned how much the Board appreciated the amount of \$350.00 which the Ladies' Circle donated to the Building Fund.

In the absence of Mrs. Margaret Hopkins, Mr. Hank Van Dyk Jr. moved the adoption of the Choir Report as printed; seconded by Mr. John de $\forall$ ries.

Mr. Hank Van Dyk Jr. mentioned his interest in getting the 8-12 year olds for a Junior Choir. He is attempting to find the most suitable time for practices. At the moment the period is scheduled for 7:00 p.m. on Wednesdays.

In the absence of Mr. Wilfred Race, Mr. John Davidson moved the adoption of the Young Peoples' Report as printed; seconded by Mr. J. Widdis. CARRIED.

& short discussion ensued regarding the Young Peoples' study course concerning the comparison of major world religions with Christianity.

 $\mbox{Lr. Files}$  conveyed thanks to Mr. W. Race for his valuable leadership and to Ruth and John Davidson for their valuable work with the teen-agers.

Mr. J. Widdis, who is working with Mr. T. Marburton on the Vision Committee, gave a report on the new vision.

Two main objectives have been drawn up:

- (1) to determine the nature of Parkwood Church in the period between 1969-75 by establishing goals;
- (2) to provide a pattern for the development needed to achieve these goals.

Out of this has come five general specific goals. These were derived after the results from the questionnaire, recently submitted, were analyzed. The points are as follows:-

- (1) increasing effective Christian witness by growth in numbers and dedication;
- (2) involvement in community support activities;
- (3) the construction of a church building;
- (4) giving beyond our own needs takes into account such things as givings to the Biafra Fund, National Development Fund funds which are external to our own congregational needs or even our own Presbytery; and promotion of individual participation in secular beneficient projects social welfare.
- (5) self supporting from the Presbyterian Church at large.

Out of these general goals comes the specific goals:

- (1) We have to achieve growth in numbers and dedication 200 families by 1975. There must be more frequent church attendance and a full normal range of congregational activities. This also includes greater willingness to serve when asked. Meet budget each year; meet pledges and aim for offerings of \$20,000 by 1975.
- (2) involvement in community support activities.

Mr. Pett, at this point, was asked to and did discuss the Evangelism and Social action Committee's proposals i.e. coffee parties etc.

(3) since the discussions concerning the possibility of jointly building a church with Bethany Baptist have broken down we had to revise our plans as follows:

Phase One we need a general purpose building by 1971, not to exceed \$100,000

Phase two - a church building or sanctuary by 1980.

Mr. Widdis moved that the General and Specific goals be adopted as a long range plan by the congregation of Parkwood Presbyterian Church; seconded by Mr. Hank Van Dyk Sr. CARRIED.

Mrs. Ellen Robertson moved that the General Goals be amended by adding Phase (3) to read "that a temporary prefabricated building be investigated for the future of the congregation which was to be part of Mr. Francis' future report; seconded by Mr. John Robertson. CARRIED.

Mr. Tom Milne moved the Board of Managers' Financial report as printed by accepted and Mr. W. ...cKenny seconded it. As an amendment to the motion Mr. H. Van Dyk Sr. moved that we carry the church advertisements in both papers for one year and also investigate the cost of a flier. Seconded by Mr. R. McIntosh.
